A typical day of a care volunteer

A typical day of a volunteer starts around 7.30-8.00 in the morning. The volunteers have their breakfast at their host families and leave for the placements.

Breakfast generally includes rice and



curry, bread, noodles, Pittu, hoppers, String hoppers etc.

Usually placements are not too far from the host families. Most of the care placements are within walking distances. Our volunteers get used to the walking under the hot sun in Sri Lanka!

At the pre-schools the volunteers do helping out with the activities with the kids, helping out the local teachers, initiate new group activities such as color-



ing. They always enjoy the life with the kids.

At the end of the day they will come back to the host families and have their own time. They usually meet the other volunteers and share their experience with the rest of the volunteers while having a cup of tea!
